"I see the role also encompassing responding to requests from Dons Trust, WiSH members and supporters, being



a resource for the Club, external journalists, media companies and other parties who require access to former players, from confidentiallyheld details maintained on a secure database set up by Stuart Deacons.

"On a wider scale, I'd like to raise awareness of our past, the history, and heritage – the heroes and the villains – for new staff, players and other interested parties who may not be fully conversant with our unique story. Then, to help bring it all together going forward.

"So far, I've arranged Sammy Moore's first visit to Plough Lane (with his family), which, with assistance from Chris Slavin, Andrew Stead and others, saw him enjoy meeting many guests in matchday hospitality and be introduced to an appreciative crowd before the 2-0 win over Barrow."

"I was treated like a King" said Sammy afterwards. "It's been so good to see so many familiar faces still here too – everyone looks a bit older, but no one's really changed! To have been part of this journey is amazing. It was the best day for me and my family and thank you to everyone who organised it."
